



Empower Young Leaders to lead and tackle climate action to create a just and sustainable society.








Young Leaders Development Programme






YLDP 4 Feedback

The YLDP was a transformative experience, and I am so pleased to have had the opportunity to participate."










Policy Engagement

At the end of January 2021, 2050 Climate Group was invited to speak to MSPs in the Environment, Climate Change and Land Reform Committee as part of an evidence session on the Climate Change Plan Update (CCPU). Election Survey



2050 Climate Group were invited to submit their election priorities to Scottish political parties. The Policy Subgroup subsequently surveyed young people and members of the Leaders Network on their Climate Change priorities for the upcoming Scottish Parliament Election. These priorities were presented to all parties to help shape party manifestos.


- 68 young people in Scotland were surveyed on election priorities
- 88% chose climate change as one of their top priorities for the 2021 election



Working with other young people organisations in Scotland, Young Leaders from 2050 Climate Group played a pivotal role in organising the youth climate husting 'Climate Hot Seat' which brought together leaders from the main political parties in Scotland ahead of the Scotlish Parliament Election.



Leaders Network



The Leaders Network allows Young Leaders, past and present, to build knowledge, develop projects, collaborate with others, share skills and lead climate action towards a just and sustainable society.

Our Leaders Network, now 550+ people strong, can create and take advantage of opportunities to influence climate change by connecting to a network of hundreds of young people across Scotland.



2050x Fund

2050 Climate Group has funded 4 climate action projects over the past year. These projects are:

- 1. Community Energy Short Film about community investment in renewables.
- 2. Scotland Schools COP26, a three-day conference for school pupils from 10 Scottish secondary schools.
- 3. Electrek Explorer, a new app and website being developed for electric vehicle drivers.
- **4. Lum** is a handmade homeware brand which creates luxury, sustainable cushions inspired by nature, whilst also supporting wildlife conservation and biodiversity in Scotland.







And Then Vision for 2050



The Leaders Network "Vision for 2050" project, in partnership with AndThen, engaged our existing network to create a participatory vision for Scotland 2050 and how we might get there. The project was carried out over Whatsapp in order to engage a wider number of people remotely. Over 50 young leaders from 2050 took part in the project. Over the course of 4 weeks, AndThen sent participants tasks to carry out over WhatsApp and gathered the data together to create a vision for Scotland's future. The project developed three main objectives, "A Sustainable Scotland", "A Just Scotland" and "A Scotland Beyond Net-Zero".

Climate Networks for the Future












Equity and Diversity at COP26



This webinar, organised in collaboration with Malawi Scotland Partnership (MaSP), examined how COP26 can overcome barriers to equity and inclusion to ensure that all countries are represented equally in the climate conversations. It also offered insight into issues around climate justice, exploring the intersecting inequalities that result from climate change, and how the solutions must be social as well as scientific.

We gathered a panel of international young climate activists and experts to discuss the topic.

The webinar attracted 133 registered attendees from a broad range of countries including Malawi, Zambia, Kenya, U.S.A, and the UK.










Malawi Climate Leaders \ ______



The Malawi Climate Leaders Project responds to the need for leadership and climate action by young people.

It supports the ambition, innovation and passion of young people in Malawi to be the catalysts of change towards a sustainable, low-carbon and climate resilient future, focussing on the themes of:

- Engagement & Education
- Empowerment
- Connection

Malawi Climate Leaders is a joint initiative between the Malawi Scotland Partnership and 2050 Climate Group.

To date, 50 Young Leaders trained with the knowledge and skills to advocate for the climate emergency. Through three large scale training events, 9 regional engagement sessions and 9 demand driven skills development sessions, Young Leaders have been given the tools and leadership skills to be a force for change. Our steering committee brought together experts from across Malawi and Scotland to support the project in its implementation and direction, working with Young Leaders for the future of the project.

As well as their intensive training, Young Leaders have also designed and developed small project interventions, including organic manure, waste management, briquette making, affordable clean energy, forest restoration, sustainable water body conservation and environmental conservation awareness.



IPPR Environmental Justice Commission

IPPR's Environmental Justice Commission was convened to help develop the ideas and policies to bring about a rapid green transition that is fair and just. The Environmental Justice Commission builds on the IPPR's previous work on economic justice. We were invited to sit on the Commission to connect Scotland's youth voice with the UK-wide work this Commission undertakes. The Commission's work has included citizens juries, and we have also been a member of the Aberdeenshire Climate and Fairness Panel Advisory Board, which has been providing expert input ahead of the local citizens jury meetings in the region.

Just Transition Commission

The Just Transition Commission was an independent commission set up by Scottish Government. The Just Transition Commission aims to provide practical and affordable recommendations to Scottish Ministers in order to achieve a just transition. We had a seat on the Commission representing youth voices in Scotland, and the final report was published in March 2021 following 2 years of meetings and engagement across Scotland.





Looking Forward



Summit and COP26 engagement





An important aspect of the Youth Summit will be its output - a vision from the Summit's attendees of what 2050 should look like under each of COP26's presidential themes: nature-based solutions, adaptation and resilience, finance, energy transition, and clean road transport. Whilst this will be captured, in part, through direct written asks to COP26 decision makers on how this vision should be achieved, we will also look to have attendees produce creative media – such as poetry, film, art, and music – to accessibly reflect the key thoughts from the Youth Summit.





Diversity & Inclusion





Last year, we began to inspect this inclusivity of our organisation more closely. Although we acknowledge this is a challenge in the environmental movement as a whole, it is clear our work has not gone far enough. We realised that 'inclusive' had different meanings even within our own organisation.

We have hired Neish Training and we're taking a social learning approach, with a view to agreeing a D&I policy statement as a starting point. This will then be implemented across the organisation.

Through the Race for Nature Recovery project (a Kickstart Scheme to place young people from predominantly Black, Asian and Minority Ethnic (BAME) backgrounds in work placements at environmental organisations) we have secured a 6 month placement who will join us in the lead up to COP26.

As a result of the ongoing global pandemic the fifth iteration of the Young Leaders Development Programme was postponed. We are excited to announce YLDP will be making a return this autumn following a hybrid model of in-person and digital events. We will continue to monitor the situation to ensure the programme is delivered safely and effectively. We can't wait to welcome some more Young Leaders to the 2050 Climate Group network!
